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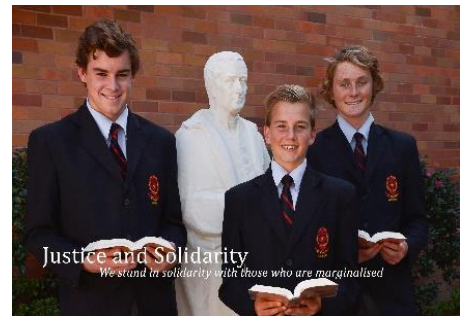

Edmund Rice Education Australia Touchstone Justice and Solidarity

As a Catholic School in the Edmund Rice Tradition we are committed to justice and peace for all grounded in a spirituality of action and reflection that calls us to stand in solidarity with those who are marginalised and the Earth itself.

Last week eight students from Year 10 were invited to attend the EREA Justice and Peace Symposium at the Edmund Rice Retreat Centre in Mulgoa. These students were selected based on their ongoing commitment to, and interest in, social justice. Students from all EREA schools in NSW attended this two-day conference, providing a wonderful opportunity for students to develop leadership skills, meet other like-minded students from across the state and be challenged to establish their own personal response to issues on refugees and asylum seekers, homelessness, inequities experienced by indigenous Australians and eco-justice. Alex Waite from Year 10 was one student who represented St Edward's at this symposium and his reflection of the experience appears below.



On Tuesday 31st October, I joined seven other boys from Year 10 who had the opportunity to attend the Mulgoa Symposium at the Edmund Rice Retreat and Conference Centre, This was organised by Mr Bonnici and the College, along with Mr Dell and Brother Burton, to learn about social justice issues within our local communities, Australia and around the world.

During our time spent at the Symposium, not a moment was wasted as we had to partake in numerous activities and discussions over the two days. Within our group we discussed the issue of climate change and how St Edwards can potentially reduce its carbon footprint by raising money by introducing solar panels in addition to the ones we currently have.



The trip was filled with rewarding experiences and eye-opening discussions with passionate guest speakers. We discussed the important issues of homelessness, the injustices that our government once committed towards our Indigenous people, the lack of compassion Australia has towards desperate Asylum Seekers and the ignorance of our Government not acknowledging the damaging effects of climate change.



Speaking on behalf of the other students, I can comfortably say that we feel extremely privileged to have attended this event and to have had the chance to bond with like-minded individuals from other Colleges. I strongly encourage future Year 10 students if given the chance, to take part in this unforgettable experience.

MOVEMBER

Over the next month, some of the prefects, senior and junior students, and I will be participating in Movember, an annual event involving the growing of moustaches during the month of November to raise awareness of men's health issues such as prostate cancer, Testicular cancer, and men's mental health and suicide prevention.

We will be raising funds that will go towards supporting the Movember Foundation's research, as well their various health promotion initiatives that aim to address these prevalent issues through prevention, rather than just a cure.

During Movember, the moustache is a ribbon – a reminder to people in your life about the importance of men's health. When in public, the moustache will often become a conversation starter that can lead to talking about more serious health issues that affect men of all ages, and are often overlooked by individuals, the media and by society as a whole.

Here are some statistics taken directly from the official 'Movember Foundation' Website:

- Prostate cancer is the **second most common cancer in men**, and the rates are on the rise
- By 2030, therefore, there'll be **1.7 million men living with prostate cancer**.
- Most **men affected by testicular cancer are between 15 and 40 years old**
- In most cases, the outcome for men with testicular cancer is positive, but a 95% chance of survival is no comfort to the **1 man in 20 who won't make it**.
- Around the world, **on average we lose a man to suicide every minute of every day**.
- **Three out of four suicides are men**. It is therefore apparent that too many are keeping silent and are struggling alone.

The Great Benefits of the School Bus

Have you considered looking into using the school bus service as a way of getting to and from school? Here's some information you may not have known that will help you make up your mind.

Kids catching the bus instead of parents driving them to school has so many benefits, mainly it can help by reducing the congestion that increases unsafe behaviours.

Did you know that bus travel is the safest form of land travel in Australia?

Did you know that school children between the ages of 5 and 16 years, travelling to and from school, are substantially safer travelling by bus than other modes of transport?

Did you know that studies run by the Institute of Transport and Logistical studies, University of Sydney show that travelling by bus is 4.4 times safer than walking, 55 times safer than riding a bike and 1.38 times safer than being driven to school?

Did you know that until the end of Year 2 bus passes are free for all students?

Did you know that if you live over 1.6km (most direct route) from the school, you can get a free bus pass?

Did you know that it only costs approx \$1/per day (\$52/term) to get a bus pass?

Other benefits of catching the bus to and from school include:

- Reducing traffic around the school, thus increasing safety for all our kids
- Reducing environmental damage from running your car
- Not having to get to school ½ hour early to get a parking space
- Promoting and encouraging safe independence with our children
- Drop off right outside the school gate (or closer to the school gate then you can get dropping your child safely with your car)
- Extra 'me' time for busy mums.

Talk to your school office or local bus company about bus routes for your school and getting a bus pass.
